### FAITH FORMATION

- <u>"Saint for the Week"</u>: <u>Saint Gabriel of Our Lady of Sorrows</u>. Francisco Possenti was born in Assisi on March 1, 1838, the eleventh child of Sante Possenti and Agnes Frisciotti. During his formative years, Francis attended the school of the Christian brothers and then the Jesuit college in Spoleto. He was lively, intelligent and popular at school. After recovering from a life-threatening illness, Francisco dedicated his life to God and was accepted into the Congregation of the Passionists religious order. Francisco would go on to receive his Passionist habit on September 21, 1856, which that year was the Feast of the Sorrowful Mother. So when he was ordained, he was given the name: Gabriel of the Sorrowful Mother. A year later he took his vows. Although Gabriel would evangelize the faith up to the end of his life, that life would end up being very brief in years, but lengthy in its impact. Having been struck with tuberculosis at the age of 24, Gabriel would pass away from this disease on February 27, 1862, before he would be formally ordained to the priesthood. Pope Benedict XV canonized Gabriel in 1920 and declared him a patron of Catholic youth. His feast day is celebrated on February 27.

# REMOTE LEARNER PARENT SURVEY IN-PERSON LEARNER PARENT SURVEY

- **Black History Month**: Although this has served as the final week of February and the formal conclusion to *Black History Month*, we continued our celebration of American innovators, inventors and leaders who changed the world in ways we may not have previously known. This week we learned about the following group whose life and work have made a lasting impact in our world:
  - Beatrice "Bea" Gaddy: Beatrice Gaddy Known as the Mother Teresa of Baltimore and St. Bea, Bea Gaddy rose from a life of poverty to become Baltimore's leading advocate for the homeless and poor. Beatrice Frankie Fowler was born in 1933 to a very poor family in Wake Forest, N.C. By the time Bea was in her mid-20s, she was a mother of five, living on and off welfare. In 1964 she would make her way to Baltimore. Later earning her bachelor's in human services from Antioch University in 1977, she would commit her life to helping others. Her work in human services inspired her to establish a homeless shelter, a community kitchen for the needy, a furniture bank and a program that refurbished abandoned row homes for families in need. Ms. Gaddy was eventually elected to the Baltimore City Council in 1999. And although Bea Gaddy may not fall under the category of an inventor, her tireless and innovative efforts to help the disadvantaged of Baltimore certainly changed our world for the better.
  - O Henry Blair: Henry Blair was an African-American inventor who, in 1834, became only the second black man to receive a United States patent that was awarded for his work in developing a mechanical corn planter. Blair's corn planter resulted in more efficient crop planting and resulted in greater overall yield for farmers. Blair was born in Glen Ross, Maryland in 1807. Born as a freeman, Blair would go on to work in the farming industry and although he could neither read nor write, he would successfully manage his own independent business as a commercial farmer near Glen Ross. Later, Blair would go on to later develop and obtain a patent for his mechanical cotton planter.
  - Springs, West Virginia, in 1918, Katherine Johnson would demonstrate an intense curiosity and brilliance with numbers that would help her to graduate with highest honors in 1937 with a dual degree in Mathematics and French from West Virginia State College. In 1939, West Virginia University integrated its graduate program and Katherine and two men became the first black students offered spots at the state's flagship school. After raising her children, he accepted a position at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics' (NACA's) Langley laboratory in Newport News, Virginia. In 1958, Katherine joined the core of the Space Task Group that would become part of the NASA organization. In her work for NASA, she provided important trajectory analysis for America's first human spaceflight. Her work at NASA would also be essential to sending John Glenn in orbit around the Earth. Then later, she would go on to perform essential calculations for the historic 1969 Apollo 11 trip to the moon. Up to her retirement from NASA in 1986,

Katherine continued to serve as a key asset as she helped to develop its Space Shuttle program and Earth Resources Satellite. In 2015, Katherine Johnson was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

- Edwin Roberts Russell: Edwin Roberts Russell was born in Columbia, South Carolina on June 19, 1913. He would go on to earn a B.A. from Benedict College in 1935 and an M.A. in Chemistry from Howard University in 1937. Then in 1942, Russell attended the University of Chicago to pursue a Ph.D. in surface chemistry. It was through this academic experience that led him to later join the Manhattan Project that would produce a nuclear defense system for World War II. Russell's top-secret research focused on isolating and extracting plutonium-239 from uranium. He would later become a research chemist for DuPont where he would earn eleven patents researching atomic energy processes.
- Elizabeth "Mother Mary" Lange: Mary Elizabeth Lange was born around 1794 in Santiago de Cuba. She received an excellent education and in the early 1800s, Elizabeth left Cuba and settled in the United States. By 1813, God's providence directed her to Baltimore, where a large community of French speaking Catholics from Haiti was established. As a well educated woman, it did not take Lange long to recognize that the children of her fellow immigrants needed an education. At that time, there was no free public education for children of color in Maryland. She responded to that need by opening a school for the children in her home in the Fells Point area of the city. God's providence would once again intervene through a priest named Fr. James Hector Joubert. He presented Elizabeth Lange with the idea to found the first religious congregation of African American women in the history of the Catholic Church, the Oblate Sisters of Providence. The international motherhouse for the Oblates can still be found here in the Baltimore area.
