- "Saint for the Week": Saint Katherine Drexel. Katherine Drexel was born. Katherine was born 1858 to a family of wealth. Despite their wealth, Katharine's parents did not allow their children to live a sheltered life. Three days a week, their home was opened to feed the hungry and serve the poor with clothing and rental assistance. During her travels, she became particularly moved by the plight of American Indians and African Americans. She very easily could have married, but after discernment and spiritual direction, she decided to dedicate her life to serving American Indian and African American people. Her decision made big news in the elite social circles of Philadelphia; newspapers wondered how she could walk away from married life and an inheritance worth more than \$100 million in today's dollars—to serve poor people. Katharine would go on to establish a religious order of nuns-the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament-whose mission was to serve people marginalized by American society. In 1915, Katharine opened Xavier University in New Orleans, the first Roman Catholic university in the nation that accepted black students. Katherine's religious order had more than 500 members. With her assistance, the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament had opened 145 missions, 49 elementary schools and 12 high schools. Today, the order continues its missionary and educational work. During her life she had given approximately 20 million dollars to help people in need. Katherine would eventually pass away at the age of 96. In 2000, Pope John Paul II would canonize her as Saint Katharine Drexel. Her feast day is March 3 and she serves as the patron saint for racial justice.

- <u>Celebrating the Life of Cardinal James Gibbons</u>: This month, the Archdiocese of Baltimore marks the centenary of the death of Cardinal James Gibbons, ninth archbishop of Baltimore. Cardinal James Gibbons was 86 when he died March 24, 1921. A native son of Baltimore, he was the second American to be elevated to the College of Cardinals, a hero to the labor movement, a champion of ecumenism and an advisor to presidents. Archbishop Lori will celebrate the Mass and invites us to join this special Eucharistic Celebration via livestream at <u>archbalt.org</u> or on the Archdiocese of Baltimore's <u>Facebook page</u>.

- <u>Women's History Month</u>: During Women's History Month, we will provide increased focus on the contributions of influential females whose contributions leadership and life's work has made a lasting impact in our world. This week we highlighted Rosa Parks, Susan B. Anthony, Jeannette Rankin and Dorothy Reed Mendenhall. In addition, we offered a "this day in Women's History" fact (<u>https://todayinwomenshistory.org/</u>). Here are the informational facts we shared this week:
 - <u>March 2</u>: Susanna M. Salter, mayor of Argonia, Kansas, was born today in 1860. She was the first woman elected as mayor and the first woman elected to any political office in the United States.
 - <u>March 3</u>: In 1913, the Women's Suffrage Parade in Washington, DC, gathered over 8,000 women to demand a constitutional amendment guaranteeing the right to vote.
 - <u>March 4</u>: In 1933, Frances Perkins was sworn in as Secretary of Labor, and became the first woman U.S. Cabinet member.
 - <u>March 5</u>: Louise Pearce, one of the foremost pathologists of the early 20th century, was born today in 1885. She found a cure for trypanosomiasis in 1919 and researched the African sleeping sickness.
